SUBJECT: Critical evaluation of information online

LESSON TOPIC: Developing skills to critically evaluate online sources

DURATION: 45 minutes

LEARNING OBJECTIVE/S:

Students will develop critical thinking and media literacy skills necessary for evaluating online information effectively.

Competencies acquired: applying critical thinking skills to analyze online content, practicing media literacy techniques to interpret information accurately.

MATERIALS/RESOURCES NEEDED:

- Module 4 (<u>https://www.digi-civis.eu/e-learning</u>)
- Checklist of credibility indicators
- Whiteboard and markers

METHODS/TECHNIQUES:

The lesson includes an interactive lecture on critical thinking and media literacy.



LESSON PLAN OVERVIEW

PREPARATION:

- Develop a lecture focusing on critical thinking (including problemsolving, active listening, decision making, etc.) and media literacy (including reflecting on one's media choices, identifying sponsored content, recognizing stereotypes, etc.) skills, including how to analyze and interpret online information.
- Print a checklist of critical thinking and media literacy indicators for students to use during analysis.

IMPLEMENTATION:

- Introduce the importance of critical thinking and media literacy in evaluating online information. Using the module 4 of the e-learning course, explain and demonstrate critical thinking and media literacy techniques.
- Students complete a checklist to evaluate their current skills in critical thinking and media literacy.
